The Important Election

The most important job in the country is not located in the White House but in your house. It is not President, but husband, wife... father, mother. Regardless of how the November presidential election turns out, far more important is that God has elected you for those roles, those vocations. Long, long before he instituted the nation, the Lord put in place marriage and the family... his first weapon in the battle array against Satan. The down to earth, domestic, ordinary callings of husband, wife, father, mother are the primary tools God uses to pass along faith in Jesus Christ. Whether your children and your spouse will trust Christ as their Lord, depends much more on this divine election and you delivering the Word of Christ for

them than on either candidate for president and his promise to deliver.

A journalist, sportswriter, former college athlete wrote recently:

"Nearly 30 years ago, in a 1993 Nike commercial, professional basketball legend Charles Barkley fired the first shot at the "role model" concept popularized by Columbia University sociologist Robert K Merton, in the aftermath of the 1960s counterculture movement. "I am not a role model," Barkley proclaimed in the half-minute spot. "I am not paid to be a role model. I am paid to wreak havoc on the basketball court. Parents should be role models. Just because I can dunk a basketball doesn't mean I should raise your kids."

The writer continues: "Of the many phrases and concepts Merton coined, "role model" has had the most impact. On the surface, the argument that young people tend to model their behavior after high profile, successful adults is harmless. However, in retrospect, the elevation of athletes and other celebrities as primary figures in the formation of behavioral norms for young people helped create the conditions that are powering the destructive Black Lives Matter movement today (which on its own website states as one of its goals: "The dismantling of the Western proscribed nuclear family.") Merton's role model concept undercuts the importance of parents and nuclear families. That was the point of Barkley's criticism... Technology has advanced the (decay), diminishing the influence of traditional authority figures and strengthening the reach of celebrities. Kids shut their bedroom doors, turn on their televisions, laptops, and game consoles, plug-in earbuds, open social media apps, and disappear into a world far removed from mom and dad." So, as I sit here in the exact same building I sat in back in December, I think about how much has changed in the last 10 months. It really gets summed up in one short story.

There is an on-post shopping area here at Fort Bliss called Freedom's Crossing. It has everything that we need and more from bargain stores to food court to sit down restaurants to higher end shops. It has been a frequent destination over the last 3 or 4 days because it is a constant reminder that we are home.

This shopping area is .8 miles from our barracks...the exact same .8 miles it was in December. Nothing has change about that distance.

In December, I distinctly remember how unwilling I was to walk to Freedom's Crossing. If the shuttle was not running, I was not going. It was a ridiculous thought to even consider. Fast forward through 9 months of walking everywhere in 110 plus degree heat with sand storms and long days and here I am.

I walked to Freedom's Crossing THREE times yesterday. Haven't waited on the shuttle a single time since we have been back.

Why? What changed?

The distance is the same. The temperatures are about the same. I didn't even buy anything yesterday. I just went.

The difference is perspective, I guess. My view of the world is not what it was last year. And that isn't a bad thing. Day before yesterday I walked 12.16 miles and I didn't even think about it. It is a new reality.

The church is in a new reality as well. We must understand that with the not-so-subtle changes in our world, we are not operating in the same reality we were in this time last year. We have choices to make about ministry in our congregation and in our own lives. But we have to keep one thing in mind as we do:

Though our ministry must change to meet the demands of the world we live in, the reason for our ministry has not and will never change.

I told a friend the other day, "The world has moved in a lot of ways, but the Cross is exactly where it was. It has not moved." We are still serving the same Jesus that we were before our world got turned upside down. Exactly like the post resurrection disciples/ apostles, we have to adjust to the new norm and keep sharing the love and hope of Jesus in the world around us. Prayers for you and for me as we determine what God has in store for us as we make that transition.

(And that transition leads me home...see you in a few days.)

St. Paul Quilters

During the quarantine, the Quilters of St. Paul were asked to sew masks for those needing them. Over 100 masks were delivered to the office and handed out. We hope they provided comfort and defense.

Linda Schlather deserves kudo's for cutting scrap fabric into kits so they can be made into quilt tops. An interesting fact we've discovered, each quilt top weighs about 1 pound. Linda cut and kitted 28. For those of you that sew or can help cut and kit, please come to Room 210.

The devasting explosion in Beirut that occurred in August not only caused severe damage, injury and death to those near the Port but an estimated 22,000 quilts were destroyed in the blast that Lutheran World Relief had in 3 shipping containers. Those quilts were to go to refugees and others affected by the unrest in the area.

On the home front, the 247 plus quilts the St. Paul Quilters were to send were NOT in the explosion. They were safely boxed and ready to go when the COVID-19 virus delayed transporting them to Seguin. The Quilters of St. Paul are planning on taking quilts to Seguin November 4. Help is needed moving packed boxes from the sewing room (Room 210) downstairs and on trailers and pickups. No box weighs more than 27 pounds.

If you can help move boxes and/or transporting quilts to Seguin on November 4, please meet in the office foyer and we can get the job done. Many hands make light work.

Each quilt has prayers and wishes for safety and comfort stitched into every one.


