In the scheduled Bible reading last month and this month, Jesus is after not the religious cleanliness or righteousness projects of the self; he's after your heart... and he'll get it in such a way that family relationships and relationship with the rest of your neighbors are redeemed, shaped and defined by him. As Christ's church, we are a Pentecost people. I don't mean we are Pentecostals, as in our neighbors in that denomination; I mean that the church is the work of Christ's Holy Spirit on, for and through us. As Jesus bluntly puts it in John 6.63, our "flesh is of no help at all," we cannot by our own reason or effort believe in Jesus or come to him, but the Holy Spirit calls, gathers, enlightens and sanctifies us. The schedule of Bible readings we follow each year on a 3-year cycle, pull us out of the black hole of our-

selves and give us instead Christ's voice in our ears. Instead of the preacher's or the culture's current interests or anxieties, we read the life of Jesus and the life of his church each year, starting over every Advent. Here we are deep in the season of the life of his church, Pentecost season. And what Jesus addresses to us is the conflict between our human hearts and his kingdom... and his forgiveness for sinners like us who don't deserve it.

As our kids and grandkids head back to school (God bless our local superintendents, school boards, and our governor) and the culture rages and totters with anxiety and animosity, the best thing you and I can do is hear Jesus and his Holy Spirit speak to us in the pew on Sundays and at our dinner tables and bedsides during the week... and then calmly, clearly share his reign with our neighbor in word and deed. Keep washing your hands, mask up if you need to, and above all give Jesus to your neighbor and bear one another's burdens.

Living on the Vine

This month I am simply going to quote Martin Luther. I have a devotional book, *Faith Alone*. It contains 365 devotional readings, one for each day of the year. Each day has a Bible verse and Dr. Luther's comment on that verse.

"I am the vine. You are the branches. Those who live in me while I live in them will produce a lot of fruit. But you can't produce anything without me." -John 15:5

By saying that believers live in Him and He lives in them, Jesus is making it clear that Christianity is not something we put on externally. We don't put it on like clothes. We don't adopt it as a new lifestyle that focuses on our own efforts, as do those who practice a holy lifestyle they have invented themselves. Rather, Christian faith is a birth brought about by God's Word and Spirit. A Christian must be a new person from the depths of his heart. Once the heart is born anew in Christ, these fruits will follow: confession of the gospel, love, obedience, patience, purity and so on.

In this passage, Christ warns his disciples that they must remain in his Word. Remaining in the Word leads to genuine, newborn Christians. These true Christians produce much fruit. They guard themselves from the teaching that perverts God's Word and that tries to make grapes from thistles and thorns. This will never happen, however, because each kind produces its own kind. Even if you teach about, strive for, and pile up good works, your nature won't change. You must first possess a new nature. You won't accomplish anything by striving and exhausting yourself.

The two types of work remain vastly different. The one type of work is produced by human effort, while the other grows naturally. The works we make up always require us to strive harder, but they never do as well as natural growth. In contrast, natural growth stands, moves, lives, and does what it should naturally. So Christ says, "All other human teaching cannot succeed because it instructs people to make up works. But if you live in me, as natural branches live on the vine, you will certainly produce good fruit." - Well stated Martin!
